Reasons for removing dairy herd from the lower part of the campus:

1. The inspectors from the State Board of Health, Dairy Division, are constantly complaining of the insanitary condition existing at the present dairy, but admit that it is being kept as well as possible under such conditions.

2. We have a fine dairy herd for this section of the country - during the past thirteen months we have had the highest average milk production of any herd in the state, and the highest average fat production for eleven of the thirteen months - but cannot get the production we should get from these coaws under existing condtions, nor the price we could get were we prepared to have the cows on official test.

3. If we remain in the present location we will have to re-roof all sheds and two barns, build a calf barn, and build another silo, and concrete the cow lot to get rid of the mud. These improvements will cost

from 3,000.00 to \$4,000.00 dollars.

4. We will have to build another addition to the dairy barn in the spring of 1930 to take care of addit-

ional cows. This will cost around \$1,500.00

5. It will be impossible to build the next dormitory in the place prepared for it if the dairy herd is left in its present location, as its back will be less than

100 feet from the present dairy barn.

6. NINEAXNEALMENT Olmsted Brothers recommend that the dairy barn be removed. Of course this is Kranxena Kranxen

7. If the dairy herd remains in the present building we will have to erect a carpenter shop and a parkage building for the pottery kiln for the Art Department. I have no idea what the cost of this will be but it will certainly amount to several thousand dollars.

It will be seen from the above that the Dairy Barn, etc. can be built Kak next year for half the amount it will cost if it is built later, taking into consideration the expenditures necessary if the herd remains where it is. This is aside from the fact that it will be very much more efficient in a new location.
